- 3. What success(s) and/or failure(s) does your group have in the public policy arena? If you have been successful getting major legislation passed (or blocked), describe this victory. If you have been successful getting using litigation to achieve your goals, describe a successful court case. If you have been successful electioneering, discuss how you achieved this victory.
- 4. How much money does your interest group have and how is the money used?
- 5. Include a quotation to best describe your interest group.
- 6. An appropriate pick up line for your interest group leader/organization.
